- Are there any pledges in attendance this morning?

- Please introduce yourself to these new members and give them a warm ESA welcome when you see them today.
- The membership report dated 2/28/24 from ESA Headquarters shows there are 234 members in Indiana. At leadership last month I was told that ESA is looking at positive membership growth this year! Just the idea of that being a real possibility is very exciting. I have much more to share about my experience at ESA leadership later in my report.

- A nomination for 1st Vice President was received on time. Pam Vogel will be on the ballot at State Convention for the office of 1st Vice President.
- Per Article 2 Section 5 of the ISC Bylaws qualifications of those nominated from the floor shall be read. Included in the qualifications, which shall be submitted to the First Vice President in writing, shall be verification of payment of International Council and State Council Dues and membership dues of the candidate.

- A bid for Fall Conference and State Convention were received by the January 1st deadline from Chi Omicron for Fall Conference and Delta Delta for State Convention.
- Per Article 1 Section 2 of the ISC Bylaws state that if there are no bids submitted to
 the Nomination Committee by January 1 or if all of those submitted are not
 acceptable due to non-payment of International Council and State Council Dues by
 January 1, chapters may submit bids from the floor at the Annual State Convention.
 Chapters submitting bids at the Annual State Convention for a Conference must
 submit verification of payment of International Council and State Council Dues. At
 State Convention a bid for Spring Conference will be made from the floor.
- Thank you to each of you for willing to say yes to taking this ESA Journey with me.
- The theme for the 2025-2026 ESA year will be ESA a journey for all. I am excited to take this year long journey with all of you.
- Last month I traveled to Denver Colorado to attend the ESA Leadership Conference. Before I get into the nuts and bolts of the conference I want to thank you for the opportunity to attend the conference. The cost associated with this conference is one of the largest budget items of the Indiana State Council budget each year. At the conclusion of my summary of the leadership conference I hope you feel like it was money well spent.
- The overall theme of the conference was Grow Your ESA Garden. IC President Lynda Edwards is a master gardener and her theme is Bee Kind, Bee Present Bee Engaged. The theme of the conference was tied to Lynda's theme. Many of the International Council and MARC board members attended the conference. Thursday Night, I had the opportunity to have dinner with the members of MARC that were attending the conference and I attended the welcome party. Julie Whitaker is the incoming MARC President and is looking for members to run for MARC office and to serve as members of committees for MARC. Please reach out to me if you are interested in MARC or want more information about serving on the MARC board. I was assigned to Team Yellow with 6 other ESA members. Each team sat together for almost all the conference. Each team was challenged to make creative social media posts tagging ESA Leadership 2025 and our team color in the posts as well as a variety of opportunities to score points. This challenge was multi fold it brought awareness to ESA though social media, increased our social media abilities and was on ongoing team building exercise with a prize to awarded at the end of the conference. I posted several times while at the conference on our Indiana ESA Facebook page. I appreciate all of you who took the time to comment and react to my posts. Team Yellow was crowned Color War champion!
- ESA Headquarters have completed quit a transition since we were together at IC
 Convention in July. Shai Hendricks is the Executive Director. With Tracy Swanson's

- retirement the membership contact has changed. Mackeigan Bickel is now the contact for members like us. Deena Steele is the contact for new members.
- There is now ESA branded Vera Bradley items available for purchase. I am wearing the new pearl bracelet with an ESA charm that is available for purchase. You can never have too much ESA gear, right!!
- There were outside speakers who shared with us the importance of planning, executing and reflecting on all things ESA the education portion, the service part and the association. Everything we do is done better when we plan, execute and review the good stuff doesn't happen without planning. Planning is everything from a meeting agenda to event sales, to member recruiting and retention, socials and education everything takes planning.
- 2025-2026 State Presidents had an opportunity to meet with incoming IC President Celeste Webb and our very own BJ Voll who is serving as the 2025 IC State President's Chair. It was great for me to know going in that there would be a familiar face at the conference. Celeste will use the theme of Anchored in ESA. Celeste and BJ shared great information about what to expect in the upcoming months. Celeste asked that I share with you all that a bid for the 2028 IC Convention is needed just something for Indiana to consider. The 2025 IC Convention will be held in Cary North Carolina, 2026 will be held in Norfolk Virginia and 2027 will be held in Portland Oregon. Indiana has two members who will be running for office Brenda Campbell and Lynn Howley. I have reached out to Brenda and Lynn letting them to know that the Indiana membership stands ready to assist with the run for office in any way we can. Brenda and Lynn are working on buttons for the Indiana delegation to wear at IC Convention in July.
- Turning our attention to the ESA Foundation we are not the only state to express frustration with the time involved with the Turn Around Fund. All I can say is that the issue was acknowledged but a solution was not provided. A new employee was to start working shortly after the conclusion of Leadership so maybe this new person will be of help to resolve the Turn Around Fund delay. The 501 status of ESA has been an on again off again topic of discussion so I thought I would visit it again today. ESA Membership Corporation, which is us, has a 501 c4 status. The ESA Foundation has the 501c3 status. The other sticky topic when it comes to the ESA Foundation is the \$5 fee charged to the students who apply for scholarships. The short answer is the \$5 fee is here to stay it covers the costs associated with maintaining the database that tracks the scholarship applications.
- Ok I have rambled on long enough we need a break. With Jenni Russ's help we are going to play a version of Let's Make a Deal game show. Grab your purse, tote bag, belt bag whatever you got with you. Your table is your team.
 - Show me a can of hairspray
 - Show me dental floss

- Show me a postage stamp
- Show me a library card
- Show me a coin or paper money from another country
- Show me a grey or silver in color credit card
- Show me beauty salon business card
 - Which table had all 7 items? 6 items? 5 items? 4 items?
 - Here is a small token for being utterly prepared!
- Ok this little break is not really random. The theme or name for the IC Challenge at IC Convention is Pick, Play, Give. You will need to raise \$200 to participate in Pick, Play, Give. The money raised from the Memphis Marathon does not count towards the \$200 needed to participate in the IC Challenge. The challenge will have a Let's Make a Deal feel to it. You are encouraged to bring a costume of your choice to convention to wear to Pick, Play, Give there is no theme so the possibilities are endless. So maybe not clean out your purse so well for this trip but be sure you can get through TSA at the airport a purposeful balance of things you just might need.
- IC Convention A Southern Serendade will be held July 13 20 at the Embassy Suite by Hilton Durham/Research Triangle hotel. IC Convention full registration is \$275 if postmarked by 5/1/2025. The hotel room rate is \$175 plus tax for single/double occupancy, \$185 for triple and \$195 for quad occupancy. The registration form and the tentative convention agenda is available on the ESA website. I have a sign-up sheet to pass around for those who are intending to attend IC Convention.
- I want to share with you some membership information but not in terms of numbers. With the positive net growth in membership comes some difficult discussions. I found the membership discussion at leadership to be very heavy and just generally a lot to process. There is a strong call for ESA to gain diversity and acceptance within our membership. There is growth of members who are minorities at the local level but not participating beyond their chapter level. Mainly because some of the ESA traditions are not inclusive. With diversity in mind the Arizona State Council has re written the opening and closing rituals recited at state meetings to reflect nondenomination/non-Christian references. There are chapters that are altering their community involvement to not include Christian based holiday themes and to include non-Christian religious observances. Remember when we rewrote ceremonies to remove her, she, etc.? This is the next step of those changes. To add some perspective, ESA was a book club started in 1929 and now we are a service organization who gives millions of dollars to St. Jude each year. I didn't have this perspective at first but as I sat on a plan flying home from the conference writing this report, I began to not view the discussion as a new discussion but a continuation of one that started years before.

- When looking for new members we are encouraged to look at places we already are

 our jobs, sports fields, extended family gatherings. These are people who are likely
 already supporting our ESA efforts so they could bring their talents to ESA in a more
 formal way. Members at Large are also another place to look for members they
 were part of us at some point and maybe they want to rejoin us.
- Beth Perkins with St. Jude/ALSAC spoke about the hospital and fundraising. The
 good news is that Dream Homes are alive and well outside of Indiana. In states like
 Indiana where the state gaming laws prevent raffles like Dream Homes there is work
 being done to partner with realtors and a builder to have something like a Dream
 Home be available in states like ours. Be on the lookout for more information about
 a project like this to become a viable option for us.
- We have not participated in radio a thon in a while. After COVID it was discovered that money could be raised without the expense of phone banks. The phone banks that we used to staff are no more.
- St. Jude/ALSAC is very interested in seeing the return of Walk the Dog events in some form. Walk the Dog was a dog walk organized by ESA that occurred throughout the country. Here in Indiana the walk was held at Eagle Creek Park in September.
- There will be a new Volunteer Management System rolled out in July. If you have not enrolled in the St. Jude VMS please do so. The hours that you work for St. Jude is tallied in that system. You cannot volunteer at a St. Jude/ALSAC event, for example the St. Jude Walk/Run, without creating an account in the VMS. Did you know that our volunteer hours have an hourly rate value? Do you know what the hourly rate value is? \$33.45 per hour donated.
- St. Jude Global Program is alive and well. Our country's status with the World Health Organization does not impact the work that St. Jude does around the world. Most recently St. Jude was able to bring 144 patients and their families from Gaza to Memphis for treatment.
- St. Jude researchers have cured sickle cell disease and is sharing that protocol freely as it does with all of the protocols. There is a new 15 story tower being built on the campus in Memphis.
- Rick Shadyac retired at the end of February. Rick's father Dick and Danny Thomas were friends. The support of the hospital by the Shadyac family goes back to the start of the ALSAC and St. Jude. Danny Thomas himself attended the St. Jude Gala on Saturday night at IC Convention for many years. Then his daughter Marlo Thomas joins us at IC Convention. Most recently a member of the hospital administrative/fundraising team attended IC Convention on Saturday night to share with ESA all the great things happening at St. Jude and to thank us for the support ESA offers the hospital. St. Jude also has a patient or a patient family attend the St. Jude workshop at IC Convention. At IC Convention this year the patient and their

family will attend the St. Jude Gala on Saturday night at convention so that everyone at convention can hear the message from the patient not only those that attend the workshop.

- The St. Jude/ALSAC office located in Indiana will not be contacting the ESA for St. Jude Coordinator to share involvement opportunities. The members here in Indiana will need to make the contact with the office to find out how we can be involved with local events to benefit St. Jude.
- Information on Hope for Heroes was shared at leadership by Patty Gale from Arizona. Patty is the IC Hope for Heroes Chair. Is your chapter supporting Hope for Heroes? Please report the work you are doing to Cindy Norman as the Hope for Heroes Chair. Cindy will provide the information you give her to Patty so that your work in Indiana can be reflected in what ESA is doing across the Country with Hope for Heroes. There is no official reporting form to provide to Patty. Patty will accept the information in any form that is sent to her.
- Towards the end of Leadership, a video was shown about leaders and followers so to close this report I want to share the video with you.

- There have been 6 donations to the ESA Foundation since May 16, 2024 totaling \$420.00. I wish to also recognize Chi Omicron for using the Turnaround Fund last month.
- As I mentioned in my LAMP article, one Indiana student will receive a scholarship award from the Indiana ESA Morton and Judy Lester Endowment. This is made possible by contributions to the fund and healthier market returns when evaluating the three-year rolling rate. 
Melissa Sexton

- Riley Children's Foundation celebrated 100 years in 2024
- Established the Noble Society, which is made up of organizations that have donated over \$1 million dollars
 - ESA is part of the inaugural Noble Society!
- Published a new history book on Riley Foundation, ESA is on page 133
 - There is information about a \$13,000 van highlight for the 70 year celebration that ESA was part of
- Melissa has Camp Riley shirts available for \$12.00 if anyone is interested
- Save the Date for the ESA Tour of Camp Riley
 - Saturday April 26th at 11am
 - We will tour the facility, fishing dock, there will be a photo opportunity with the 70th banner
- Camperships are still needed, last year Camp Riley ventured into funds for adults to attend camp
- Top priorities with donated funds:
 - o Refresh the camp fire pit, tower and path
- Camp costs \$400/week for the camper but up to \$4500 for one week per camper.
- This is the nations largest barrier free camp
- Camp Riley applications are open to college students, especially early education and nursing students

Pam Couch-Vogel, 2nd Vice President/Philanthropic

- I would like to take this opportunity to give an update on the following philanthropic state projects:
- Camp Riley Survey
 - Last month, I asked each chapter to take the opportunity to weigh in on possible future projects involving Camp Riley. I received 8 responses. Once the results were tallied, the results are as follows:

Camp Riley Survey Results



- There were 8 chapters who chose to participate in the survey. Each chapter answering what commitment level they would be interested in supporting and what type of project they would be interested in seeing to completion. The results indicated the participating would either not make a monetary commitment at this time or would be willing to commit in the \$1000-\$10,000 range (both 42.9%).
- In regard to projects selections, the highest percentage went to the category of asscessibilty improvements with a various monetary range (25%). All other projects considered had an equal percentage of 12.5% and included improving archery range storage, accessibility climbing equipment, camper supplies, nature play space and outdoor path lighting, update amphitheater stage, and outdoor nature play space.
- Comments included some chapters being smaller and not feeling they could support a bigger project, others would like to see a timeline for completing projects, and others indicated they would be interested in a project while still being able to support camperships. This project is not intended to get away from camperships, rather be in addition to camperships.

 I have receive a proposal from a member asking the state to consider taking on a legacy gift with Anna's Celebration of Life Foundation verse donating money to the organization and asking them to use the money where they see fit based on need. Legacy gifts can be used by many families, children and future generations. Legacy gifts can include accessible equipment for parks, technology equipment for learning centers or schools, or special needs classroom equipment.

Philanthropic Sub Committee

 The philanthropic subcommittee met on March 11, 2025. Both the Camp Riley survey and the new proposal for Anna's Celebration of Life were discussed. Recommentations were made to address both items at spring conference with membership. The committee plans to meet again in the near future to discuss members response to both items before making recommendations for both projects.
